## QUEENSLAND

## Geographical

Queensland is the second largest State in Australia and covers almost one-quarter of the territorial extent of the Continent.

With an area of 667,000 square miles, the State lies roughly between 138 degrees and 154 degrees East longitude, and 10 degrees and 29 degrees South latitude.

Its greatest length from north to south is 1,300 miles—the distance from London to Leningrad—and its greatest width is 940 miles.

It has a coastline of 3,236 miles washed in the north by the warm waters of the Gulf of Carpentaria, and in the east by the Southern Pacific Ocean.

## Climate

Queensland has one of the most equable climates in the world. Its range is from tropical in the north to sub-tropical in the south.

Inland, Queensland has a continental type of climate with warm sunny days and cold nights. The number of uncomfortably hot days in summer is small except along the far western border of the State.

In the coastal areas the humidity is fairly high in summer but this is offset by sea breezes and temperatures lower than are experienced inland. In the winter, the climate is mild with fine days.

Brisbane, the capital city, lies in the south of the coastal area. The highest average monthly temperature (January) is 85.5° F and the lowest (July) is 49° F. The average rainfall is 40 inches a year.

In April the average maximum temperature is 78.8° F and the average minimum 61.6° F. Average rainfall in April is 348 points and the average number of wet days twelve.

## Resources

Queensland's role of the source of raw materials has changed dramatically in the post-war years by the rapid development of secondary industries and mineral resources.

It has more than 366 million acres of pastures and more than 4 million acres are used for cropping. There are about 20 million sheep (mostly merino) and wool is produced on approximately 6,000 holdings.



## QUEENSLAND—continued

Queensland runs half the Australian beef cattle herds and though the population varies, the 1968 figure was 7,750,000. Dairying is carried out on 20,000 farms, mainly along the coastal strip.

Queensland is Australia's sugar State. In 1969 its thirty-one mills crushed a crop which produced 2,066,000 tons of raw sugar. Grain is grown on more than 2 million acres, mainly on the Darling Downs where wheat plantings vary around the 1 million acre mark. Barley, grain, sorghum and maize are also grown in quantity.

Deciduous fruits are grown in the highland region west of Brisbane known as the Granite Belt; about 10,000 acres are planted to pineapples within 100 miles of Brisbane and bananas, citrus fruits and grapes are important crops.

Tobacco, which is grown in selected areas, mainly in the north, is a thriving industry, and a wide range of vegetable crops are supplied to local consumer markets and to canning factories.

The State is richly endowed with minerals. Total production in 1969 exceeded \$270,000,000. Of this copper contributed \$90,000,000, lead \$25,000,000, zinc \$18,000,000, coal \$39,000,000, bauxite \$25,000,000 mineral sands \$10,000,000 and petroleum \$10,000,000.

Commercial oil is piped to two large refineries in Brisbane from the Moonie fields and in 1969 natural gas, of which large reserves are proved, was first delivered to Brisbane by pipeline for industrial and domestic use.

## Population

Queensland supports about 1,750,000 people. Its capital city, Brisbane, has a population of 680,000. Four cities, Townsville, Gold Coast, Ipswich and Toowoomba exceed 50,000. Rockhampton exceeds 40,000 and Cairns, Bundaberg, Mackay and Redcliffe exceed 20,000.
